Let best practices guide your development project around pitfalls

10. Educate everybody.
9. Document every step of the development process.
8. Be proactive and vet every resource used in the development process, from people to paper.
7. Implement written procedures to protect your IP.
6. Implement written procedures to avoid misusing others' IP.
5. Enforce your procedures.
4. Avoid red flag scenarios, or if unavoidable, carefully manage them.
3. Be diligent throughout the entire process, not just at the beginning.
2. If you are accused, do not panic and make things worse by trying to cover your tracks or misleading internal investigators.
1. Lawyers are your friends. Really. So when in doubt, consult one.
